5

This is not so much a lament as it is an observation. Normal people do not grumble when things are going well.

8-9

Job wishes to die. The expression "cut me off" is a metaphor from a weaver who cuts off the excess thread on a loom. (Isa 38:12).

10

Job seems to agree with his friends that pain is the result of sin, but he denies that he has done anything to bring this evil on him. This confuses him and makes him feel like he is denying God's Word, but of course he is not.

14

True friends love you even when you have messed up.

15-21

Job says that his friends are completely unhelpful to him.

22

Job points out that he has not asked them for anything.

24

Job calls out to his friends and says "If you have something helpful to say, I will be glad to listen."

28-30

Here is Job's claim, "I am innocent." It is like he tells them, "Come on guys, tell me what I have done wrong."

Job's Despair (1-7)

¹Then Job replied:

² "If only my anguish could be weighed and all my misery be placed on the scales! ³ It would surely outweigh the sand of the seas-- no wonder my words have been impetuous. ⁴ The arrows of the Almighty are in me, my spirit drinks in their poison; God's terrors are marshaled against me.

⁵ Does a wild donkey bray when it has grass, or an ox bellow when it has fodder? ⁶ Is tasteless food eaten without salt, or is there flavor in the white of an egg? ⁷ I refuse to touch it; such food makes me ill.

Job's Request for Death (8-13)

⁸ "Oh, that I might have my request, that God would grant what I hope for, ⁹ that God would be willing to crush me, to let loose his hand and cut me off! ¹⁰ Then I would still have this consolation-- my joy in unrelenting pain-- that I had not denied the words of the Holy One. ¹¹ "What strength do I have, that I should still hope? What prospects, that I should be patient? ¹² Do I have the strength of stone? Is my flesh bronze? ¹³ Do I have any power to help myself, now that success has been driven from me?

Job Rebukes His Friends (14-30)

¹⁴ "A despairing man should have the devotion of his friends, even though he forsakes the fear of the Almighty. ¹⁵ But my brothers are as undependable as intermittent streams, as the streams that overflow ¹⁶ when darkened by thawing ice and swollen with melting snow, ¹⁷ but that cease to flow in the dry season, and in the heat vanish from their channels. ¹⁸ Caravans turn aside from their routes; they go up into the wasteland and perish. ¹⁹ The caravans of Tema look for water, the traveling merchants of Sheba look in hope. ²⁰ They are distressed, because they had been confident; they arrive there, only to be disappointed. ²¹ Now you too have proved to be of no help; you see something dreadful and are afraid.

²² Have I ever said, 'Give something on my behalf, pay a ransom for me from your wealth, ²³ deliver me from the hand of the enemy, ransom me from the clutches of the ruthless'? ²⁴ "Teach me, and I will be quiet; show me where I have been wrong. ²⁵ How painful are honest words! But what do your arguments prove? ²⁶ Do you mean to correct what I say, and treat the words of a despairing man as wind? ²⁷ You would even cast lots for the fatherless and barter away your friend. ²⁸ "But now be so kind as to look at me. Would I lie to your face? ²⁹ Relent, do not be unjust; reconsider, for my integrity is at stake. ³⁰ Is there any wickedness on my lips? Can my mouth not discern malice?
